In 2017, Dr. Monday received a Master of Science in Veterinary Biomedical Science, with an emphasis on replacement heifers and bulls from Kansas State University. While working toward her master’s degree, Dr. Monday began her service with the Texas A&M Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory as a Bovine Veterinary Diagnostician.

Her years of experience in the animal agriculture industry, vast knowledge of food animal medicine and her passion for diagnostic innovations and developments will continue to help the TAHC serve the state of Texas in mitigating disease spread. Dr. Monday continues to develop professionally with a recent board-certification through the American College of Veterinary Preventative Medicine (ACVPM) in 2022.
